

What to look for when choosing your English Angora



This is a photo of a baby Angora at the age of 7 weeks. He is not perfect but he shows a nice compact body, and good face and ear furnishings even at this age. Furnishings on an English Angora are the wool on the face and ears. By this age you should see evidence of wool on an EA's ears, a good wool cap

on its forehead and full cheek wool as well. Do NOT accept a baby younger than 7 weeks of age. There are entirely too many things that can go wrong when you take a younger bunny.



This is the same little guy at the age of 10 weeks. Notice his tasseling (the fur on his ears) is filling in well. He also is still showing a nice compact (short) length of body. We like to see an Angora look somewhat like a basketball with a flattened bottom. As they grow older it will give them the proper "ball of fluff" look we want to see in a showable English Angora. If someone tries to sell you a bunny with no ear wool or face wool it is NOT a quality English Angora. No evidence of wool on the ears may mean crossbreeding somewhere down the lines.

These two photos are the same rabbit at age 4 weeks and 7 months of age. Even at the age of 4 weeks you can see wool growing in on her ears and on her face.
